Now, you surely have noticed the construction fence encircling the one-story "shopping center," an eyesore for decades, on the NW corner of 5th and Spring Garden. Here is the artist rendering of the new structure replacing it: a 382-unit, 12-story, mixed use building that will include on the ground level the first Amazon Grocery store in Philadelphia. The building site is directly across the street from YARDS. The City of Philadelphia sees planned urban development. We see more.....PIEROGI LOVERS!



MORE ABOUT 5TH & SPRING GARDEN

IN THE NEWS last week:

Beneath the parking lot, directly in front of the Dollar General store, construction workers find an old cemetery dating back almost two centuries....to 1832

Before the 5th & Spring Garden corner was a shopping mall, the site was a gas station and before that, in the 1800s, home to **FIFTH STREET METHODIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH** that included a small cemetery where church members were laid to rest.

Last week, when breaking ground for the new building, construction workers discovered some forgotten graves beneath the asphalt parking lot. Archaeologists arrived on the scene, excavated the space, hand-sifted through the gravel to find several old coffins from the Church's cemetery. The remains were documented, excavated, and transferred to the forensics laboratory located at Rutgers University in Camden, NJ

Fifth Street Methodist Episcopal Church was founded in 1832 by the Rev. Joseph Rusling. By 1882, the church had 350 members and a Sunday school with 374 students and teachers.





Father Bohdan's Sermon Sunday, July 25, 2021 Matthew 8:28-9:1

We all do it at times: take the easy road to avoid confrontation. That easy road is turning around, turning our backs on a problem we see.....and in our Scripture reading today, that problem was two men who were violent and demon-possessed.

When confronted by these two violent men as He passed through the area where they lived, did Jesus turn around and find another way to avoid them? NO! He faced the demons and cast them into the herd of pigs so that they did not cause any more trouble.

Scripture readings can be interpreted in many ways, and the demon-possessed men can represent everything from an uncomfortable confrontation...to sinful ways....to evil.

Unlike Jesus, we very often run away rather than face a problem in the eye. We keep ourselves insulated. We would rather have peaceful, undisturbed lives. Of course, peace is good. But if that peace is fantasy, that is not good. It's a peace that says: I don't care what happens - as long as it does not affect me.

Let's ask ourselves a question: WHAT WOULD JESUS DO when confronted by the evil in the world? From our Scripture reading today, we know what He did. He confronted the demons. So the message to you today is this: do not ignore evil in the world. Do not run away. Don't worry that you are just one person. God has a great history of changing the world through just one person!

6TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

PRIEST: Let us attend! Peace be unto all!

READER: And to thy spirit.

PRIEST: Wisdom!

READER: The Prokeimenon in the 5th Tone: Thou, O Lord, shall protect us and preserve us

from this generation forever!





