

On Sunday we commemorate the Feast of the Holy Transfiguration of the Lord,

although the actual holiday on the calendar is Saturday,
August 19. The Gospels tell that Jesus took three of His
disciples – John, James and Peter -- up a mountain where
they witnessed His transfiguration – His change -- into
divine form: His face shone like the sun, His garments
became brilliantly white as snow, and a voice from heaven
proclaimed that this was the Son of God. In the
Transfiguration, the disciples see the majesty of the
Kingdom of God present in the person of Christ. The
Church gives us comfort by showing us that after the
temporary sorrows with which our earthly life is filled, the
glory of eternal blessedness will be ours. And the end of
summer is an appropriate time to celebrate this Feast as it
is customary to bless the crop of a first harvest on this day.

The blessing of grapes, fruits and vegetables is symbolic of the final transfiguration of all things. Just as fruits ripen and are transformed under the hot summer sun, so is man called to a spiritual transfiguration through the light of God's word. We pray to God to sanctify both the souls and the bodies of those who eat these fruits, to keep their lives peaceful and joyful, and to multiply these fruits abundantly.

MESSAGE FROM CATHEDRAL COUNCIL PRESIDENT: TOM HANNEY



Greetings! I hope everyone is having an enjoyable summer. There's never summer vacation at St. Nicholas Cathedral. It's business as usual, all year round. We are even busier in the summer as that is when the Festival Director, Judy Hanney, and her team, start preparing for our biggest annual fundraiser of the year: the PIEROGI FESTIVAL, this year on Saturday, November 4, and Sunday, November 5.

Published next to this message is the food prep schedule for the Festival. We expect to have dozens of parishioners at every session.

Most of the year we come and go as individuals, with very busy everyday schedules. But at this time of the year, we ask you to perform a Labor of Love for God and your Church. This is about working as a team and having the dedication of a team to succeed. Do this now! Mark it a Priority! Make Saint Nicholas a Priority! Choose as many dates as possible and dedicate yourself to being there for your team.

Showing up when there is work to be done says you are truly a member of Saint Nicholas. Not showing up says you are just a visitor.

The money raised from the Festival will pay the utility bills for the Cathedral and the Rectory. The true cost of operating the Cathedral is approximately \$16,000 per month. If you are unable to put anything in the collection basket, this is the time to contribute to the Cathedral with your labor – and chop onions, steam cabbage, pinch pierogi. And work at the Festival. If you attended Divine Liturgy and find serenity and a heightened spirituality, this is the time to give thanks and work as a team to achieve our financial goal.

THE SCRIPTURE READING FOR SUNDAY, AUGUST 20, 2023

11TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST

PRIEST: Let us attend! Peace be unto all!

READER: And to thy spirit.

READER: Brothers...If I am not an apostle to others, yet doubtless I am to you. For you are the seal of my apostleship in the Lord. My defense to those who examine me is this: Do we have no right to eat and drink? Do we have no right to take along a believing wife, as do also the other apostles, the brothers of the Lord, and Cephas? Or is it only Barnabas and I who have no right to refrain from working? Who ever goes to war at his own expense? Who plants a vineyard and does not eat of its fruit? Or who tends a flock and does not drink of the milk of the flock? Do I say these things as a mere man? Or does not the law say the same also? For it is written in the law of Moses, "You shall not muzzle an ox while it treads out the grain." Is it oxen God is concerned about? Or does He say it altogether for our sakes? For our sakes, no doubt, this is written, that he who plows should plow in hope, and he who threshes in hope should be partaker of his hope. If we have sown spiritual things for you, is it a great thing if we reap your material things? If others are partakers of this right over you, are we not even more? Nevertheless we have not used this right, but endure all things lest we hinder the gospel of Christ. (1 Corinthians 9:2-12)

But as he was not able to pay, his master commanded that he be sold, with his wife and children and all that he had, and that payment be made. The servant therefore fell down before him, saying, 'Master, have patience with me, and I will pay you all.' Then the master of that servant was moved with compassion, released him, and forgave him the debt. But that servant went out and found one of his fellow servants who owed him a hundred denarii; and he laid hands on him and took him by the throat, saying, 'Pay me what you owe!' So his fellow servant fell down at his feet and begged him, saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you all.' And he would not, but went and threw him into prison till he should pay the debt. So when his fellow servants saw what had been done, they were very grieved, and came and told their master all that had been done. Then his master, after he had called him, said to him, 'You wicked servant! I forgave you all that debt because you begged me. 'Should you not also have had compassion on your fellow servant, just as I had pity on you?' And his master was angry, and delivered him to the torturers until he should pay all that was due to him. So My heavenly Father also will do to you if each of you, from his heart, does not forgive his brother his trespasses. (Matthew 18:23-35)
