also known as St. Sampson the Innkeeper and Holy Unmercenary*

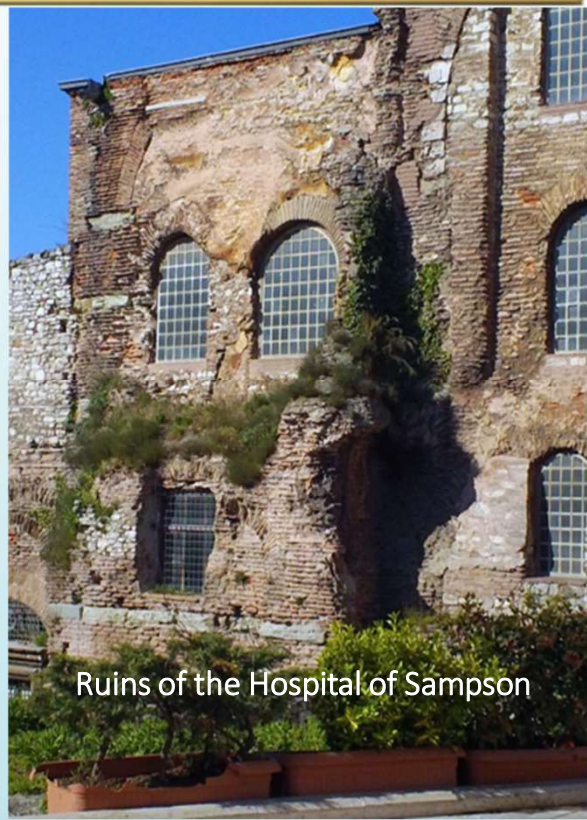

Saint Sampson

was born in Rome in the 4th Century to a prominent, wealthy family. He lived during the reign of Saint Justinian the Great (527-565). St. Sampson became a physician in Constantinople turning his home into a clinic for the sick and poor. Because of his great virtue, St. Sampson was ordained a priest by the Patriarch of Constantinople. When Emperor Justinian fell ill, it was St. Sampson who was called to heal him. Out of gratitude, the Emperor built St. Sampson a large hospital, the largest free clinic in the Byzantine Empire, known as the Hospital of Sampson, which served the people of Constantinople for 600 years. After his death in 530, St. Sampson appeared many times to those who called upon him for aid.



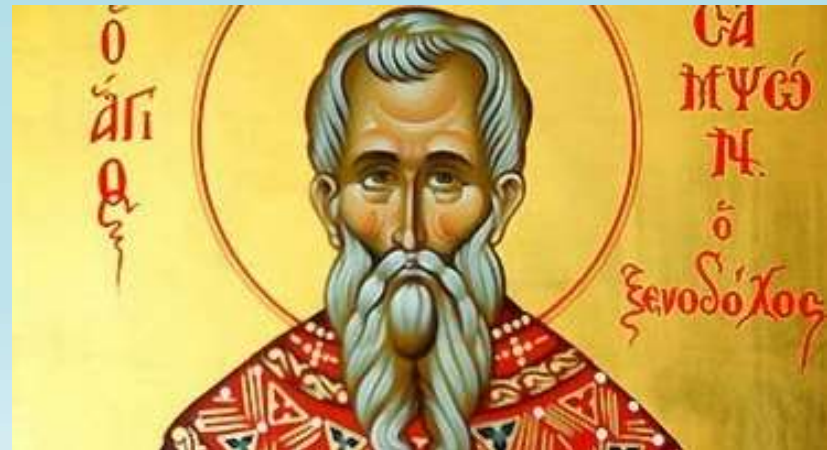
Ruins of the Hospital of Sampson

No doubt about it..... our Northern Liberties neighborhood is booming. Yet another real estate project – within walking distance of St. Nicholas Cathedral -- is about to break ground.

For those parishioners who come to Philadelphia via the Ben Franklin Bridge and drive up 5th Street, you will no longer see Golden Age Adult Day Care and Colonial Electric Supply on your right as you cross Callowhill. In its place will be this 7-story building with 220 residential units and 70 parking spaces.

4TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST



PRIEST: Let us attend! Peace be unto all!

READER: And to thy spirit.

READER: Brothers...And having been set free from sin, you became slaves of righteousness. I speak in human terms because of the weakness of your flesh. For just as you presented your members as slaves of uncleanness, and of lawlessness leading to more lawlessness, so now present your members as slaves of righteousness for holiness. For when you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. What fruit did you have then in the things of which you are now ashamed? For the end of those things is death. But now having been set free from sin, and having become slaves of God, you have your fruit to holiness, and the end, everlasting life. For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord. **(Romans 6:18-23)**

PRIEST: Let us attend. Now when Jesus had entered Capernaum, a centurion came to Him, pleading with Him, saying, "Lord, my servant is lying at home paralyzed, dreadfully tormented." And Jesus said to him, "I will come and heal him." The centurion answered and said, "Lord, I am not worthy that You should come under my roof. But only speak a word, and my servant will be healed. For I also am a man under authority, having soldiers under me. And I say to this one, 'Go,' and he goes; and to another, 'Come,' and he comes; and to my servant, 'Do this,' and he does it. When Jesus heard it, He marveled, and said to those who followed, "Assuredly, I say to you, I have not found such great faith, not even in Israel! And I say to you that many will come from east and west, and sit down with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob in the kingdom of heaven. But the sons of the kingdom will be cast out into outer darkness. There will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. Then Jesus said to the centurion, "Go your way; and as you have believed, so let it be done for you."
